

MNI: Ukrainian Strikes on Russia’s Oil Infrastructure Tracker

- **Russia’s crude processing volumes averaged 5.41m b/d** across Jan. 15-21 as the intensity of drone attacks diminished, according to Bloomberg.
- **Tuapse and Novoshakhtinsk remain offline**, while **Ilsky boosted runs to 100k b/d**
- The tables show **reported Ukrainian attacks on Russian oil infrastructure since October**. Given the frequency of attempted strikes, the list may not be exhaustive.
